This weekend we close out the magnificent Christmas Season with the Magi. I've been proclaiming this Gospel from our Patron Saint for 39 years as a priest.

The three Wise Men came from different beliefs, different cultures. They studied stars, and somehow, they were open to following a star, but didn't know what they would encounter. So they trusted. And they trusted something good would happen. They followed and when they arrived, they recognized Mother and Child. They recognized Christ.
